## **Parent Portal News**


The parent portal will be upgraded shortly. We hope to be able to commence payments for Fees and Excursions electronically soon after this.

# A Great Partnership

For the past 15 months St Albans Secondary College has been an active member of the Brimbank Proactive Police Unit. This coalition of the Brimbank Police and local Primary and Secondary schools meets monthly to discuss ways of supporting our communities and keeping our students safe. The police provide free cyber-safety talks for schools, free security checks for school premises and up to date advice on how we can keep our students and members of the wider community safe from crime.

At our most recent meeting the police highlighted that theft of personal belongings from cars is at a very high rate at the moment. It is a common and serious crime and we urge our community members to practice some simple things to protect themselves and their belongings:

- Never leave your car unlocked no matter how long you think you will be away from your vehicle.
- Do not leave personal belongings in clear view of someone looking in the window.
- Don't leave mobile phones or other digital devices on car seats when the car is unoccupied.

Place items in the boot of the car in preference to inside the cabin.



# Kinship exhibit on show

AN EXHIBITION celebrating the 40th anniversary of the Vietnamese community settling in Australia was launched in St Albans last week.

The Vietnamese Community in Australia - Victorian Chapter organised the creative showcase to mark four decades since the end of the Vietnam War, when many Vietnamese refugees came to Australia.

The mobile exhibition will travel through municipalities to increase understanding of, and support for, a multicultural Australia.

The art show's launch in St Albans came about in partnership with the Brimbank Council, St Albans Secondary College and with support from the Archive for Vietnamese Boat People Inc.

The Vietnamese Community in Australia – Victorian Chapter's commissioner for youth and culture, Giang Nguyen, said many people had spent months organising the exhibition.

"We do believe it's a good opportunity for us to share out stories with the younger generation," she said.

"Australia is a multicultural country, it's good to share these things.'

Ms Nguyen said the exhibition's themes included what Vietnamese citizens went through before and after the war, the contribution of the Australian Army to the Vietnam War and the support and assistant of Australians embracing Vietnamese refugees.

This week, during International Refugee Week, the exhibition will be on show at VU at MetroWest, 138 Nicholson St, Footscray from June 16-21.




# Makers Club

# GENE TECHNOLOGY ACCESS CENTRE (GTAC) EXCURSION YEAR 9 EXTENSION SCIENCE BIOLOGY By Ling Sun and Alana Nguyen

Our Extension Science class travelled to the city with Ms Cassar and Ms Mair on the 15th of May 2015, to participate in a "DNA and Forensics" program at GTAC (Gene Technology Access Centre), University High School to complement our unit of work on genetics.

At GTAC, the MU (Melbourne University) science mentors and MU scientists organised a variety of "hands on" activities for us to apply our knowledge of inheritance, genetics, DNA and blood typing to real life scenarios.

We explored testing procedures and used advanced scientific equipment and materials such as blood reactants, metrical pipettes, an electrophoresis conduit box, UV light boxes to observe STR strands.

In one activity we acted as forensic scientists and applied our knowledge of genetics to solve a murder case. We examined trace evidence to determine if an unknown substance is blood; eliminated suspects; and prepared DNA profiles using gel electrophoresis.

Our MU science mentors showed us how to collect and test the synthetic blood samples, as well as how to read STR strands and hence, solve the murder mystery scenarios provided.

We learnt how to use the equipment correctly, as well as gain further knowledge about the double helix structure by constructing models of DNA molecules.

Overall, the GTAC experience gave us a valuable insight into a working laboratory, and allowed us to develop a greater knowledge of genetics and forensic testing procedures.

It was an enjoyable and memorable experience which has continued to spark our passion for science.

It has been an action packed few weeks for middle school students especially those in year 10. On May 26th they met their mentors and participated in get-to-know you activities. The mentors were all given a guided tour of the school and by all accounts were very impressed. Term 2 is almost over now, and we are moving into Semester 2 classes for the last two weeks of the term. In Senior School we make this transition before the end of term because the Year 12 classes finish in the third week of Term 4, and we need to have about the same number of weeks in both Semester 1 and Semester 2.

Our students have worked very hard to get through the end of Semester 1 assessment, and teachers are now writing their end of semester reports for parents. Year 11 students have just completed their exams in Weeks 7 and 8 of the term. The Year 12 students sat the GAT (3 hour exam) on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> June and their Practice English Exam (also 3 hours!) on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> June (Week 9). These exams were compulsory for Year 12 VCE students and there was a full turn out to both exam sessions.

The VCAA (Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority) runs one examination at midyear on Wednesday 12<sup>th</sup> June – being the GAT or "General Achievement Test". As there was only one VCAA mid-year exam, the VCE Exam Navigator booklet for students will be coming out later this year. Enrichment programs have been running for Year 12 students in English, Accounting, Business Management, Maths Methods, Specialist Maths and History of Revolutions.

The "Stretch" Study Skills Program runs for Year 11 students in Terms 2 and 3, based on teacher feedback, and aims to improve the outcomes for students who need some extra support.

On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> June we will be running our celebration day for Year 11 students. We have a special event to mark "100 Days of Success". 100 Days of Success celebrates the progress of VCE and VCAL students through Year 11. The Senior Team has organised an afternoon event for Year 11s where we will have a guest speaker and the presentation of Awards. Awards are given for achievement attendance and participation in a variety of programs.

Many thanks to the parents who contact us when their child is absent for any reason. This is of great assistance to the Year Level Coordinators, as we will call home regularly if there are any unexplained absences for your child. The Case Management process continues to monitor closely the attendance, achievement and individual needs of all our students. # Camps, Sports & Excursions Fund (CSEF)

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund will ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School **camps** provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, **excursions** encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and **sports** teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. The allowance will be paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student will be:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.
